I. Introductions & Announcements

Gina Margillo facilitated the meeting, and began by introducing Impact Assessment and opening the floor for all partners to comment on what they think their legacy with FCEC will be. Comments included satisfaction regarding the following:

- The involvement of a number of different groups and (Bob Brodberg, Diana Lee)
- Institutionalizing of message points for the long term (Bob Brodberg, Gina Margillo)
- The inception and growth of angler education program (Linda Chilton)
- Far-reaching public health approach of program (Gina Margillo)
- At this time, FCEC's efforts are the only measures protecting public health right now (Mark Gold)

II. Palos Verdes Shelf Remedial Investigation & Feasibility Study—Presentation by Carmen White (US EPA) http://www.pvsfish.org/library/pdf/CarmenWhite6-12-07.pdf

Carmen White presented the findings of the engineering component of the Palos Verdes Shelf remediation program:

- While there has been a reduction of DDT and PCBs exceeding 1ppm, there is an increased concentration of both contaminants at the PV outfall.
- DDT breaks down into several different daughter products, while PCBs do not breakdown further.
- Most of the contaminant reduction is occurring because sediments are dispersed through wave action.

Action Items:

- The Remedial Investigation report will be completed at the end of June discussing the site's contamination and the risk it poses to human health and the environment.
- Complete a feasibility study for dredging, capping and monitored natural recovery.
- PV Shelf Technical Information Exchange Group to meet in early July.

III. FCEC Program Update

A. Family Outreach Report—*Presentation by Renee Lagloire (IAI)* http://www.pvsfish.org/library/pdf/ReneeLagloire6-12-07.pdf

Renee Lagloire reported on the data collected through the Train the Trainers program and outreach conducted by FCEC, CBOs, SEA Lab, promotoras and public health departments:

- 25 brochures distributed in 8 languages
- Through the Participant Evaluation Post Survey (PEPS) mostly non-English speakers were reached
- After the Train the Trainers program, participants showed a significant increase (up to 57% higher) in their knowledge of essential fish contamination facts.
- Throughout the Family Outreach Program's 5 years of existence, a total of 5,431 outreach events have been conducted and 579 trainers trained.

B. Consumption, Attitudes & Beliefs Intervention Findings—Presentation by Stephen Groner (S. Groner Associates, Inc.) http://www.pvsfish.org/library/pdf/StephenGroner6-12-07.pdf

Stephen Groner reported on the CAB surveys conducted to assess women's habits, attitudes and beliefs regarding fish consumption:

- In general, women reduced overall consumption of fish in the follow-up survey. However, there was an increase in the number who avoided eating fish entirely. Therefore, nuanced educational messages are important.
- Ethnic break outs found that ethnic Chinese respondents showed the highest risk levels in terms of types, parts, and preparation of fish.
- Chinese and Filipino respondents ate the most fish.
- Latina respondents ate the least amount of fish and had the lowest risk in terms of fish consumed.
- Greatest potential barriers to women changing their fish eating habits were 1) fish tastes better with the skin on, and 2) fish is a regular part of their diet.

• Greatest potential motivators that would encourage behavior change were 1) more warning signs in markets and restaurants, and 2) getting advice from their doctor.

C. Preliminary Findings of End of Contract Year FCEC Report and Partner Survey—Presentation by Guillermo Jaimes (IAI) http://www.pvsfish.org/library/pdf/GuillermoJaimes6-12-07.pdf

Guillermo Jaimes evaluated the collaborative process engaged by the FCEC:

- FCEC's collaborative accomplishments included: reaching out to a diversity of cultural, linguistic and underserved populations, creating a comprehensive message, and producing effective materials. FCEC has also increased information sharing between agencies.
- Some of the challenges included: lack of long-term planning, uneven participation, a complicated message and the challenge of working with a diverse group.
- Recommendations for the future include: 1) better defined roles, 2) provide better communication, more inclusiveness and greater transparency with decision making, 3) improve multi-year planning, 4) enhance local agency leadership, 5) expand outreach.

Action Items for FCEC Program:

• Finalize final report and submit to EPA.
